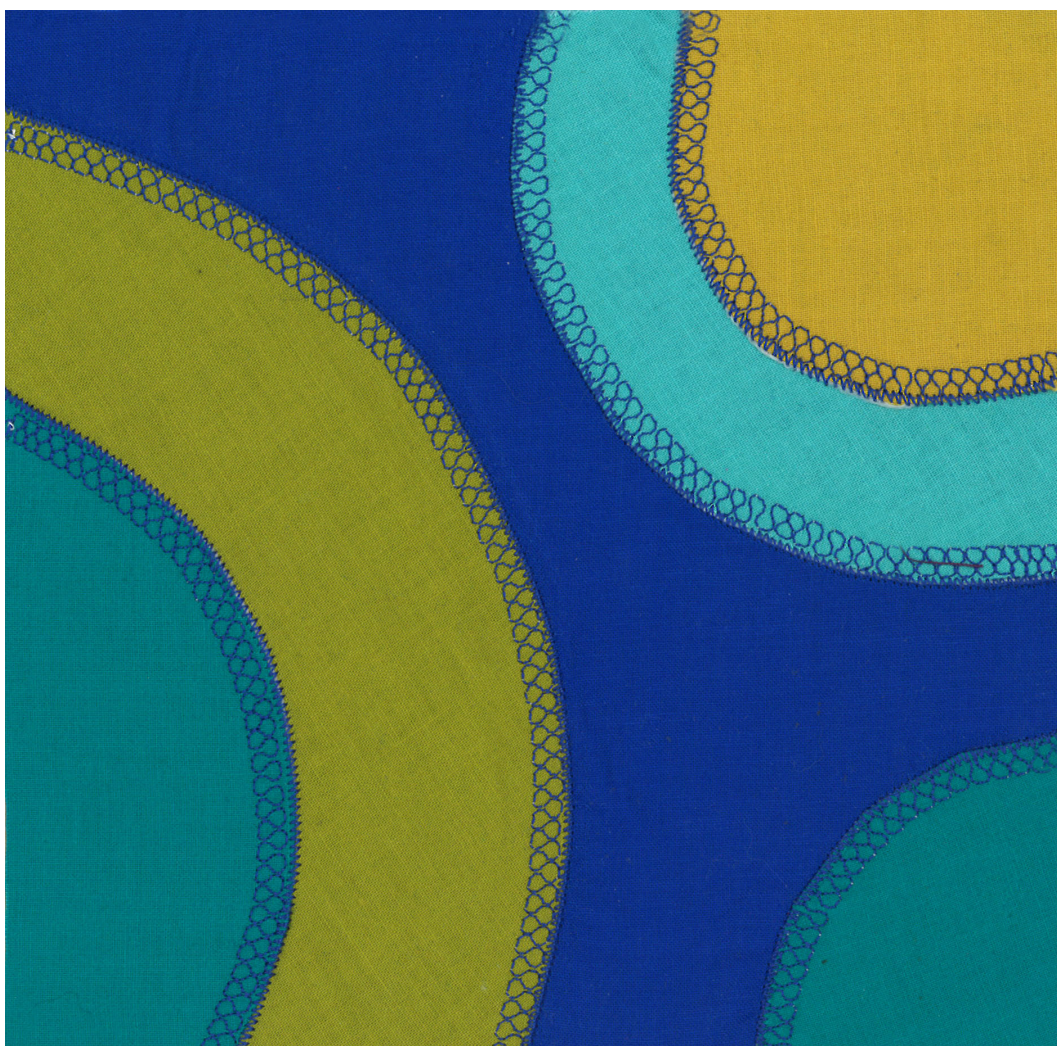


Samantha Walker Curvy Quilt Block

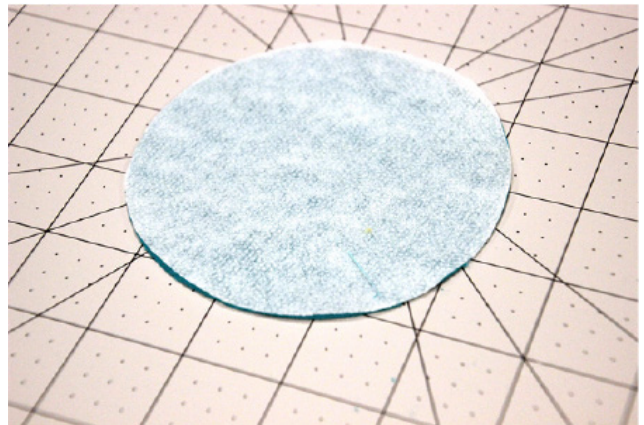
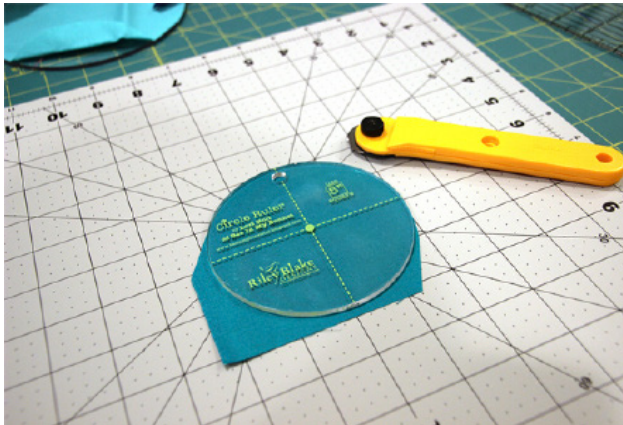


Tools:

- Rotary cutter
- Circle Quilt Templates (10, 7 and 5 inch sizes)

Supplies:

- Lightweight sew-in non-fusible interfacing such as Pellon P45-JAS



Cut the following circles:

- One 10" circle (Avocado)
- Two 7" circles (Lagoon, Luna)
- Two 5" circles (Gold, Lagoon)

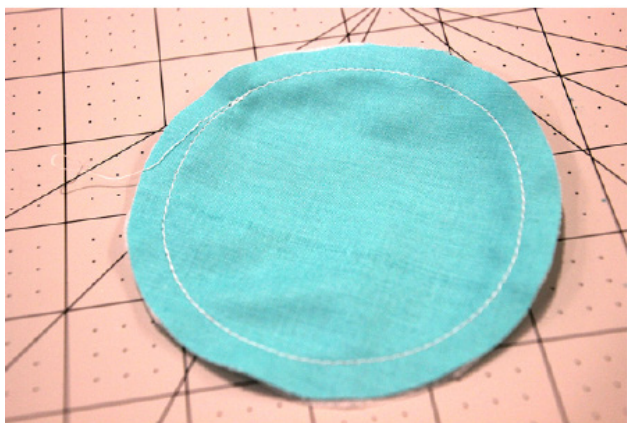
Cut the following circles out of the interfacing:

- One 10" circle
- Two 7" circles
- Two 5" circles

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Match the interfacing with it's corresponding circle. Sew the interfacing to each of the colored circles.



Make a slit in the back of the interfacing on each circle.



Turn each circle right side out so that the seamed edge is now in the inside.



Iron each circle flat.

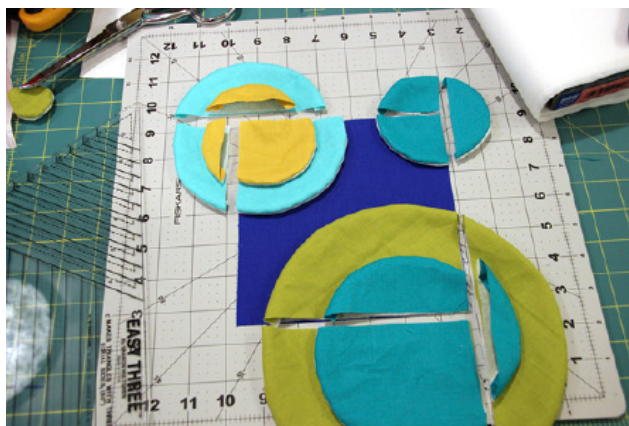
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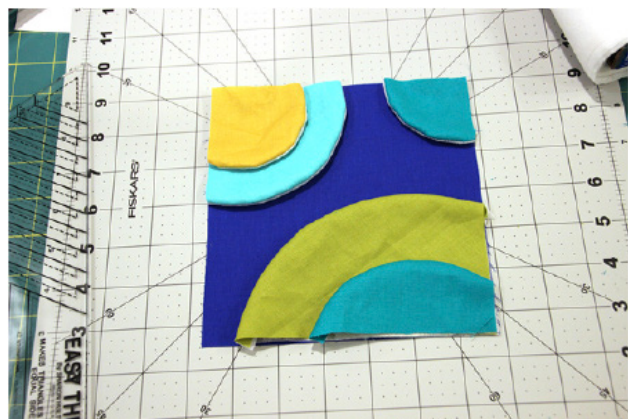
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Now for the fun part. Arrange your circles on a 6 1/2" x 6 1/2" square until you like the arrangement.



Trim each circle so that it fits on your 6 1/2" x 6 1/2" square.



Spray washable basting spray on the back side to hold the circles in place if desired.

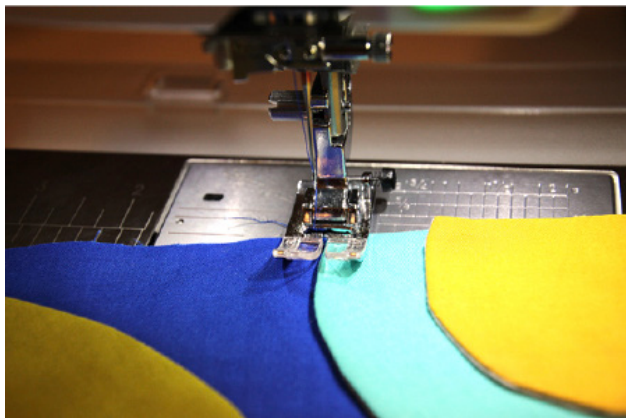


Iron flat.

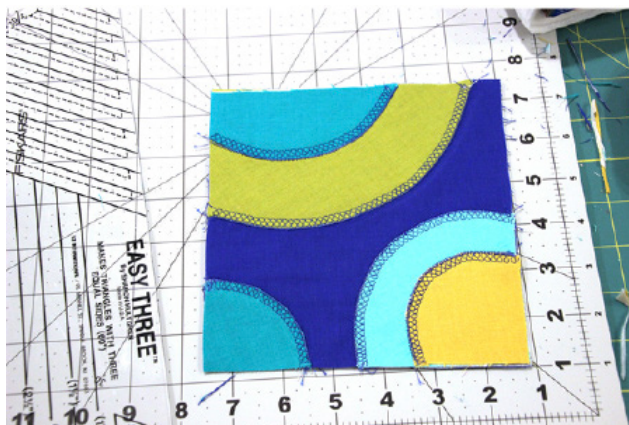
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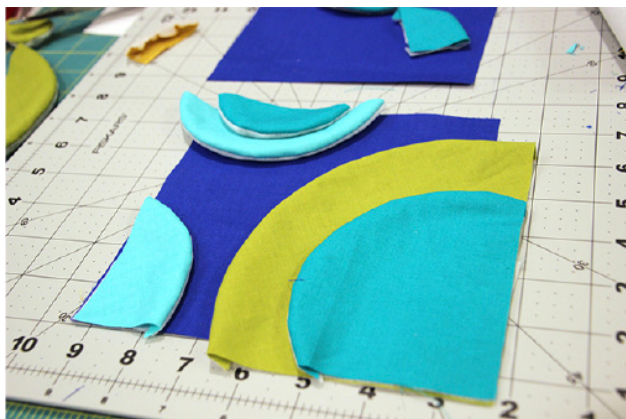
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Zig-zag stitch the circles to the block with a small and tight zig-zag stitch that follows the edge of each circle.



Choose a decorative stitch if you wish to embellish the circles further. This is totally optional.



Use your leftover pieces and arrange them to make a design on your second quilt block. Follow through the same steps you did to finish the other block.

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
